"Treemation"

The Roseville Public Cemetery District has made a new interment option available to its families. Kelly Ehrman, Roseville's Superintendent, calls it *"Treemation." Treemation* combines the interment of cremated remains along with the planting of a memorial tree. Roseville believes its *Treemation* program is the first option of this nature in its region.

Kelly says that he has been bouncing around ideas for a new option for several years. Recently he noticed that variations of Roseville's *Treemation* option are available along the North Coast of the state. None are the same as Treemation—one involves only a memorial service and the purchase of 25 trees; the other appears to be the mingling of cremated remains into the forest soil—scattering. But Roseville's *Treemation* is different. You all know that cemeteries must replace aging or damaged trees on a regular basis. In addition, for years many families have asked for interment beside or near trees. Many would also like cremated remains interment options different than the typical columbaria ("niche wall"), and at the same time creating a memorial for their loved ones that also contributes to the cemetery. To meet this need Kelly developed the idea of *Treemation*.

Under this option, families pay for the interment of cremated remains in a biodegradable urn, and the purchase and planting a new tree over the remains. The family also may have a memorial stone or marker the meets the cemetery's rules placed at or near the interment site. Kelly took the idea to the District's Board of Trustees who approved the *Treemation* option at on June 11, 2020 and adopted a list of trees approved for planting in the cemetery. Not only does *Treemation* meet the needs of the District's families, it helps with the cemetery's necessary tree replacement program and generates additional revenues.

Articles about Roseville's *Treemation* program has appeared in the local press, and Kelly appeared in a news segment on a Sacramento television station. *Treemation* has been well-received by the public and several interments have already been made
